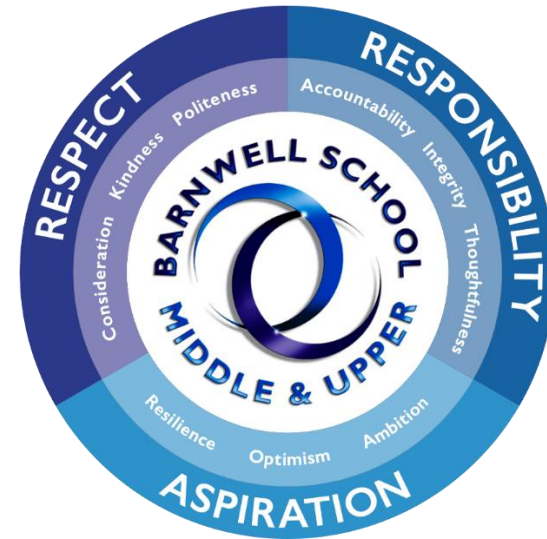
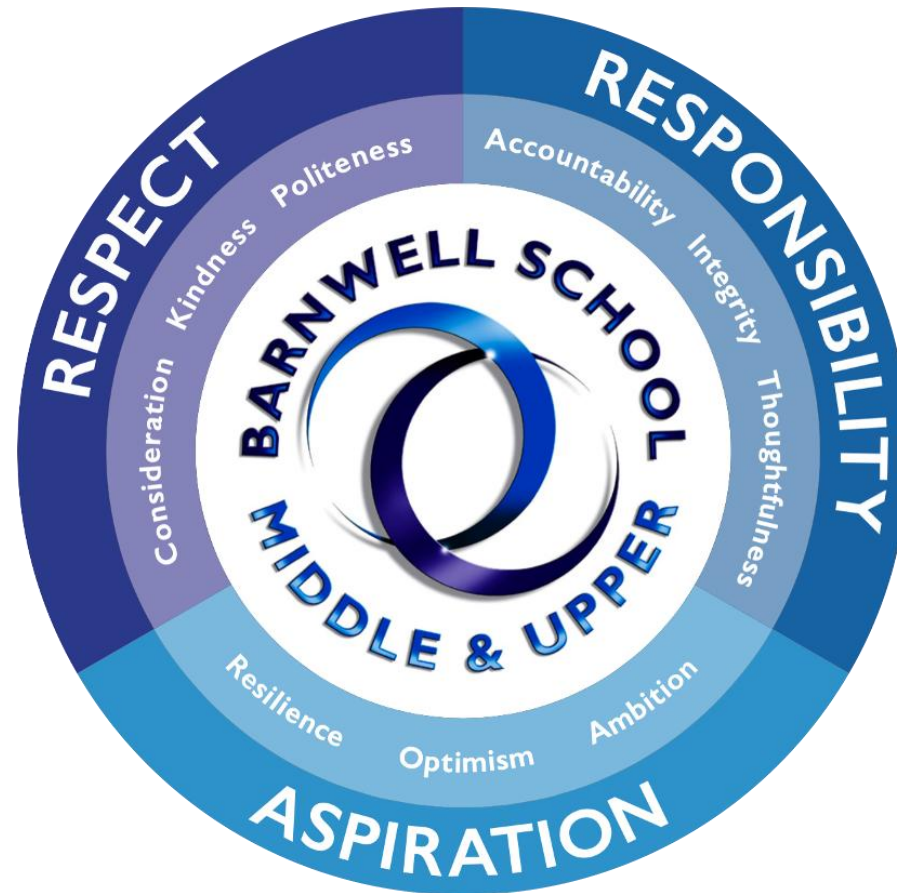

OUR SCHOOL

Our school is unique in Stevenage, located on two adjacent sites. Barnwell Middle and Upper Campus provide the best of both worlds - the advantage of two small sites that provide students with age-appropriate facilities and room to develop and grow, along with the resources and opportunities that come with a larger school. The learning environment ensures that our students achieve and reach their academic potential whilst enjoying their studies.

The school promotes a 'can do' culture and through our 'Character Education' students are encouraged to challenge themselves and aspire to be the best they can be. Our progressive and broad curriculum places emphasis on challenging students to build skills and knowledge for a successful career in the future.

We also place great emphasis on the importance of our students taking part in the school's co-curricular activities to develop qualities and skills that are valued in the workplace and community.

We very much look forward to welcoming you to Barnwell, to experience, for yourself, the positive atmosphere and outstanding opportunities it offers our students.

SCHOOL STRUCTURE

The Middle school campus is home to key stage 3 students (Years 7 and 8). At the end of Year 8, students transfer to the Upper school campus for key stage 4 (Years 9, 10 and 11) and sixth form (Years 12 and 13).

Upon starting school, in Year 7, students join one of our form groups. Heads of year quickly get to know every child. Form Tutors provide daily support and are there to ensure that students are settled and making good progress.

The school is organised, academically, into curriculum facilities, each of which has a Head of faculty who is responsible for the quality of provision and student progress.

Progress is monitored in all subjects throughout the academic year. If we identify early signs of students underachieving, we quickly put targeted intervention into place to ensure that students close their skills gaps. All students have an awareness of their progress goals and what is required to achieve them.

Our sixth form is a thriving part of our school community. We offer an extensive range of subjects. If a student wishes to study a course or qualification combination that we are unable to offer, we maximise opportunities for students through our sixth form consortium, which enables the student to study one of their subjects at another centre in Stevenage.

TRANSITION FROM PRIMARY

We understand that the move to secondary school can be both exciting and daunting for both parents and students alike - we run a highly acclaimed transition programme to ensure a smooth and effective transition to Barnwell School. We want the experience of moving to a new school to be an exciting time for our new families, we communicate regularly to reassure and support new students, whilst helping them to understand and respond to the challenges and opportunities on offer.

Our transition team works very closely with the primary feeder schools. Our transition lead teacher, the head of year 7 and student ambassadors visit all schools in the summer term. Our new intake evening introduces parents and students to key members of staff. Year 6 students also spend a day with us exploring the school, meeting relevant teaching and support staff and enjoying a day of activities.

In the summer term parents are invited to attend an information evening where they have the opportunity to find out more about our school and ways to effectively support their child.

THE PASTORAL SYSTEM

Students at Barnwell tell us that they feel part of a community and enjoy coming to school. Key to this is high quality pastoral care and support and we, therefore, make this a priority to ensure that our students quickly become involved in the life of the school in order to feel secure and settled.

Throughout the year there are many occasions where we celebrate and reward the many successes of our students, the most popular are the termly reward trips and celebration evenings.

CHARACTER EDUCATION

At Barnwell School, we are committed to nurturing not only academic excellence but also the personal growth and character development of every student. We believe that true success is built on a foundation of strong values, and we are proud to embed **Respect, Responsibility, and Aspiration** into every aspect of school life. Character Education at Barnwell is more than a programme—it is a culture. It underpins our curriculum, pastoral care, and wider school experiences, creating an environment where students are empowered to become confident, compassionate, and resilient individuals. Students who consistently meet or exceed their academic targets regularly demonstrate our core values.

Through PSHE lessons, the pastoral curriculum, and daily interactions, students are guided on how to live out these values in practical and meaningful ways. They are encouraged to take ownership of their learning, to persevere when faced with difficulty, and to support others along the way.

By embedding character education into the heart of Barnwell School, we are shaping not only successful learners but also responsible citizens and future leaders. Our students leave us not only with qualifications but with the character to thrive in life beyond the classroom.

POSITIVE RECOGNITION

At Barnwell School, we believe that recognising and celebrating student success is essential to fostering motivation, confidence, and a strong sense of community. Our extensive **rewards system** is a key part of *The Barnwell Way* and is closely aligned with our commitment to **Character Education**. By acknowledging students' achievements—both academic and personal—we help build self-esteem and encourage continued growth throughout their school journey.

We celebrate students who consistently demonstrate our core values of **Respect, Responsibility, and Aspiration**, and who contribute positively to school life. Our rewards system is designed to be inclusive, meaningful, and reflective of the diverse talents and efforts of our students.

Across the school, we offer a wide range of recognition opportunities, including:

- **Leadership Roles:** Students can take on meaningful responsibilities through the following teams: Middle Campus Co-ordination and Transition, Upper Campus Co-ordination and Revision, Rewards, Co-curricular, Student Wellbeing, Equality and Diversity and the Charity Team.
- **Character Points and Awards:** Students will have the opportunity to achieve **Character Points** on a daily basis which will lead to recognition in the form of certificates, badges, prizes and opportunities.
- **Celebration Events:** Assemblies, recognition events and Awards Evenings honour students who have excelled in subject areas or have demonstrated outstanding character traits.

Our rewards system is not just about recognition—it is about reinforcing the values that define our school community and inspiring every student to be the best version of themselves.

LEARNING SPACES

Students enjoy the benefits of outdoor resources, large sport fields, astro turf pitch, large leisure centre, and tennis courts.

The libraries on both campuses are well stocked with a wide range of reading books and are open throughout the day, including lunchtime and after school for homework club. They offer computer facilities and a comfortable place where students can learn and study independently.

Although based over two Campuses, Upper Campus students move, securely and easily, between the campuses for lessons whereas our younger students remain on our Middle School Campus. We have been fortunate to attract funding to improve facilities across both campuses - we remain ambitious for our school and are always actively seeking further funding to enable us to continue with our planned developments of newly enhanced aspirational learning environments.

The school's catering facilities provide an excellent and efficient service at break and lunchtimes. Both serve a good range of hot and cold food. Facilities on both campuses benefit from a biometric finger recognition system which provides a totally cashless environment for students.

Our Post 16 Centre facilities are excellent. The teaching, study and social areas provide an aspirational environment for students. In addition to tailored teaching facilities, there are spacious study areas equipped with many computers to support students in their study. Students have access to a member of staff at all times for advice and guidance where necessary.

QUALITY FIRST TEACHING - Consistency, Challenge and Creativity

At Barnwell we believe in delivering high quality and inclusive teaching, that draws on a range of strategies to meet the individual needs of students. Our school is a place of learning and inspiration, consistently providing opportunities and challenge. We encourage all students to have the aspiration to challenge themselves to achieve highly within their academic studies and other aspects of school life. We have an 'inclusive' philosophy within our lessons, ensuring barriers to learning are overcome through well planned, creative and stimulating teaching.

Students are encouraged to believe in themselves to achieve their academic and social potential, enabling them to succeed in securing their future in further education, training or the workplace. Our curriculum is designed to challenge and engage students, offering them the very best preparation for exam success and the skills and confidence required to make full use of their qualifications.

Barnwell is committed to provide both students and staff personal development opportunities, ensuring everyone has the chance to grow and develop.

ASSESSMENT, RECORDING AND REPORTING

Communication of student progress is essential to the teaching and learning process. Student progress is continually assessed in lessons and teacher planning for progression is structured accordingly. All students and parents are kept fully informed of progress and receive student targets and progress reports after data track points throughout the year.

HOMEWORK

It is vital that students become effective and independent learners and regular and meaningful homework is an important part of this process. It deepens and reinforces learning, builds self-reliance and fosters a sense of responsibility.

We see homework as an opportunity to forge strong home-school partnerships, giving parents and carers the opportunity to take an active role in their child's education. The school uses 'EduLink One', a parent portal and communication app, which ensures homework is set effectively across the school. Students have easy access through computers, tablets or smart phones, enabling them to see, prioritise their workload using their personalised calendar and have access to resources and links to helpful websites. Parents and carers also have access to their own 'EduLink One' account, allowing them to play a more active and supportive role in home learning.

THE CURRICULUM

The academic curriculum at Barnwell School allows our students to:

- Become hardworking, independent learners who are highly motivated to achieve their full potential.
- Be independent, ambitious, and confident learners who are fully engaged with their learning and development.
- Have and be able to use high quality functional skills, including key literacy numeracy and computing skills.
- Be confident in reading, to ensure that they can access the full curriculum offer.
- Be responsible citizens who make a positive contribution to their community and are respectful and show understanding towards others.

All students at Barnwell have access to a broad, balanced and relevant range of subjects, combining new opportunities with traditional subjects.

To support all students in their academic and social development, we have designed a personalised curriculum using the following principles:

- An inclusive curriculum that is accessible for all students and supports students in realising their full potential.
- A broad and balanced range of subjects which also develop transferable skills to support progression to the next stage of education and working life in modern society.
- Priority given to English and mathematics to ensure that students have the essential skills needed for life and to access the full curriculum.
- A wide range of enrichment and extra-curricular activities to develop personal interests, broaden cultural awareness and social skills.
- A full range of appropriate vocational and academic courses that prepare all students for higher education or training courses which meet the needs of students and prepare them with the skills required for local employment sectors.

KEY STAGE 3

Students follow a core curriculum including Art, Dance, Drama, English, French, German, Geography, History, IT/Computing, Mathematics, Music, PE, Philosophy & Ethics, PSHE, RSE, Science, Spanish and Design & Technology. There is also a structured pastoral curriculum that supports personal development and wellbeing.

During Year 7 students are mostly taught in sets and progress is assessed half termly and reported to parents three times per year.

We have recognised that by Year 9, students are beginning to consider their option choices for Key Stage 4 (Year 10). To aid this process, we have modified the traditional Key Stage 3 curriculum to allow students to focus on fewer subjects for longer periods of time during Year 9. Year 9 students opt to study a range of subjects in greater depth. This increased time allows students to begin to explore the skills and content required at GCSE level and, in addition, more curriculum time is given to Science, Geography and History.

In the autumn term of Year 9, students begin to consider their option choices for Key stage 4. Excellent information, advice and guidance is provided for both students and parents to ensure that they make the best possible choices.

KEY STAGE 4

All students work towards national qualifications, studying a broad and balanced curriculum allowing a variety of different progression routes into sixth form, further education, and apprenticeships. The EBacc is at the heart of our KS4 Curriculum, and we offer subjects in each area of the National Curriculum. All students study the core subjects; GCSE English Language, English Literature, Mathematics, Science (Triple or Combined), PSHE, RSE, RE and PE. Students then can gain deeper knowledge and understanding in up to three foundation / option subjects.

Students receive guidance on how to select the most appropriate option subjects to meet their needs, interests, aptitudes, and aspirations. Through both the academic and pastoral systems, students will be fully prepared for external exams and mentored through the transition to Post 16 studies.

KEY STAGE 4 SUBJECTS

GCSE: Art, Computer Science, Catering, Textiles, Geography, French, Spanish, History, Media studies, Business studies, Product design, Dance, PE, Art photography, Psychology.

BTEC: Health and Social care, Construction, Graphics, Sport, IT, Music, Dance and Drama

SIXTH FORM

Working in partnership across Stevenage, students are able to choose from a wide range of Level 3 A-level qualifications and vocational courses. Our curriculum allows students with a particular aptitude in a subject or with high GCSE grades to work in groups of similarly talented students.

SIXTH FORM SUBJECTS

A Level: Art and Design (Fine Art, Photography & 3D Design), English Literature & Language, Mathematics, Media Studies, Biology, Further Mathematics, Physics, Chemistry, Geography, Law, History.

CTEC/BTEC: Health and Social Care, Human Biology, Applied Psychology, Business Studies, Sport, Performing Arts (Dance & Acting), Information Technology, Music Technology, Criminology

CO- CURRICULAR / EXTRA – CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

Students are given a variety of opportunities to develop as individuals within the school. We are proud of the range of activities available to our students. There is a plethora of exciting and stimulating clubs and events that run during lunchtimes and after school. The Middle and Upper schools offer a full range to cater for every student regardless of ability and our expectation is that all students participate in at least one co-curricular activity on a regular basis. These include, amongst others, a comprehensive range of sporting opportunities, performing arts and music, computing, science, eco, karting, Duke of Edinburgh and language clubs. Students have access to a fully equipped leisure centre, Astroturf, football and rugby pitches, gyms, dance studios and tennis courts. Students are actively encouraged to use these facilities, not only during lessons, but also during extensive co-curricular activities. We even have an allotment for the keen gardeners amongst our students.

Frequent visits are organised to theatres and other places of cultural interest. Students also have many opportunities to travel abroad to practise language skills, ski and experience the culture of other countries.

PERFORMING ARTS

Barnwell School is the proud recipient of the coveted **Arts Mark Gold Award**. The Artsmark Award is the only creative quality standard for schools and education settings, accredited by Arts Council England. The Gold Award recognises schools that have established expressive arts traditions, develop and support best practice and are able to demonstrate measure effects to student engagement and community cohesion.

Drama, Dance, Art and Music lessons are timetabled for all students throughout the middle school. These, together with media studies and performing arts, are options at Key stage 4 and 5. The school also offers peripatetic music lessons for all interested students and many after school musical activities.

In addition to formal lessons leading to a range of qualifications, we hold major shows and concerts each year including an annual entry into the National competitions, where everyone can be involved whether on stage or behind the scenes.

SPORTING SUCCESS

Our sports teams regularly compete at local, regional and national level. The school runs extremely successful teams in football, rugby, netball, athletics, rounders and cricket. We regularly have students competing at county and National level in a variety of sports. The sporting opportunities in school cover the full range of the National Curriculum and are also complemented by a programme of sports days, fun run, community days and Duke of Edinburgh awards at bronze, silver and gold level.

The PE department currently offers CTEC/BTEC/GCSE qualifications for Key Stage 4 and Key Stage 5 students to build on and develop knowledge. Results in PE are consistently outstanding across all courses.

WORKING TOGETHER

Working in partnership with parents is an essential part of Barnwell. Parents are encouraged to contact the school at any time to discuss their child's progress and we feel it is important that we provide opportunities for parents to be involved in their child's education.

There are many other forms of parental contact. These can be divided into the following sections:

- Contact with subject areas – with Heads of Faculty and teaching staff.
- Heads of Year and Form Tutor contact
- Parents evening – Information evenings and Consultation evenings
- Barnwell News - weekly update

It is important that form tutors are kept fully informed of all relevant issues relating to students in their form and form tutors are the focal point for all communication with parents.

Our Parent Partnership meet each half term in an informal relaxed environment to discuss and plan school enhancements from a parent's perspective.

Visitors to the school often comment on the friendly, respectful and purposeful atmosphere at the school and our proud students who are always happy to show visitors around our school.

INFORMATION, ADVICE AND CAREERS

Our students begin their careers education during Key Stage 3. This helps students learn about and reflect upon the world of work. We stress the importance of informed choice and provide impartial careers and guidance at all times through a student's time at Barnwell.

Barnwell School strongly believes in the benefits of Information, Advice and Guidance (IAG) and Careers Education and Guidance (CEG) for all of our students. A young person's career is their pathway through learning into work. We provide all students with a planned programme of activities to help them make informed 14 – 19 choices that are right for them and to be able to manage their careers and become successful citizens.

In line with statutory guidance, Barnwell has a team of impartial and externally sourced Personal Advisors (PA's) from Services for Young People that provide face to face careers guidance. Face to face guidance with a qualified careers adviser will enable students to review their circumstances, abilities, interests and aspirations as they make decisions about future education, training and work options. This support is available for all students from Year 7 – 13. Barnwell School has invested in an outstanding resource called Unifrog which supports and tracks a student's journey through school and provides excellent online careers advice and guidance. We provide an aspirational programme of university days and visiting speakers which support our students in making the right decisions about their future. Students experience the workplace in years 8 and 10 through work shadowing days and during our year 12 work experience week.

UNIFORM

Compulsory items of uniform which must be worn / brought to school every day:

- Year group clip-on tie
- Navy Blue Blazer with School Logo **or** a logoed School jumper
- Standard white shirt with the top button fastened and tucked in
- Black trousers for all – no ‘skinny’ or denim style and no leggings
- Socks – plain white or dark colours.
- Tights- plain black or beige
- Hats, coats and scarves - when needed, can be worn to school, but must not be worn in school buildings
- Smart black closed shoes only – **No sandals, trainers, canvas, boots or plimsoles are permitted.** Every part of the shoe must be completely black. No stripes, logos, coloured soles or non-black laces are allowed.
- Should a student due to a medical reason need to wear other forms of black footwear, the school will require a doctor’s note in order to issue a uniform pass for the required period of time indicated by the doctor.
- **Cardigans and hooded tops are not permitted in school and are not to be worn as outdoor coats.**

Jewellery

It is permissible to wear the following:

- 1 earring in each ear – a small plain silver or gold single stud
- 1 watch - Smart watches or trackers that can send or receive messages are not allowed.
- No facial and visible body piercings allowed. Students will be expected to remove their piercings without exception. Clear retainers are not permitted for any facial piercings.

Make Up

Make up should be discreet and kept to a minimum. No false eyelashes, coloured nail varnish or false nails. False nails pose a health and safety risk to students as well as contravening our uniform policy. They are not permitted on any school day, including non-school uniform days.

Extreme weather conditions

In extreme weather conditions the school will undertake a risk assessment and communicate with parents when there is a temporary change to uniform.

For example, in snow and ice conditions students may be permitted to come to school wearing boots. When there are sustained high temperatures, students may be permitted to attend school without blazers and ties and when the temperature is above 30 degrees students may be permitted to wear PE kit.

When these changes are implemented, students will be informed, and details will be published on the school website.

Online Ordering

MOBILE PHONES

Mobile phones are banned items at Barnwell School. We do, however, appreciate that parents / carers may wish their child to have a mobile phone when travelling to and from school and, therefore, if a student chooses to bring their mobile phone to school, it must be turned off and handed to their form tutor during morning line-up and collected at the end of the school day.

ATTENDANCE

Punctuality and excellent attendance are key to success and certificates are awarded for high attendance levels. It is expected that students attend school every day and, in the event of absence through illness, parents should telephone the school the first day of absence on the following telephone number: 01438 761400

Authorised absence

These include half days when students are not on the school premises due to school trips or work experience, as well as illness.

Unauthorised absence

The number of unauthorised absences at Barnwell is low as we urge parents to co-operate with us to ensure that absence is kept to a minimum. We request that parents do not take holidays in term time as it seriously disrupts student education. The government has amended key legislation relating specifically to the

authorisation of leave in term time. From 1 September 2013, Headteachers in any school are not able to grant any leave. Taking students out of school for the purpose of holidays will no longer be acceptable and will not be authorised. Exceptional circumstances might include the funeral or wedding of a close relative or representing school at county or national level. Medical appointments, where possible, should be made at the end of the school day. Where this is not possible there is an expectation that students should attend school before / after the appointment.

SPECIAL EDUCATION NEEDS

Students with special needs are assessed prior to entry, in conjunction with their primary schools and parents for necessary arrangements to be in place for a successful transfer. The SENCO heads a team of experienced teaching assistants, many of whom have specific specialist training and who support students in mainstream and small learning support groups.

TIMES OF THE DAY

The school day begins for students at 8.30 am with tutor time and ends at 3.00 pm. The school day is divided into 5 x 60 minute lessons.

LUNCH ARRANGEMENTS

Students in Years 7 – 11 are required to remain at school to buy a meal from the canteen or bring a packed lunch. No student is allowed out of school at lunch time.

The school has catering facilities on each campus where catering staff provide a speedy service at break time and lunchtimes. It serves hot food and healthy options whilst also providing hot drinks and snacks. Both facilities have benefitted from the installation of a biometric finger recognition system which is a totally cashless system for students.

SCHOOL TRANSPORT

The majority of students walk, cycle or travel by bus to school. Where appropriate transport is provided by the local authority.

ADMISSIONS POLICY

The entry of children to schools is controlled and administered by Herts County Council 'admissions team'. Each school has an area that it serves – its catchment area. Most parents choose to send their children to their 'local' schools within the catchment area. However, they have the right to state a preference for their children to attend any school. Barnwell primarily serves the areas of south Stevenage and the surrounding villages. However, students do, increasingly, attend Barnwell from all over the county. The authority and each school governing body must comply with any parental preference that is expressed, providing that there is room within the school. For more information regarding places at our school for September intake at year 7 refer to the 'Moving on' booklet. For in-year admissions, where we have places, we welcome new students. Further information is on our website but for all admission applications please contact the Admissions team at County Hall.

For students entering the school in September 2025, the school has an admission limit of 240.

ANTI – BULLYING POLICY

Barnwell's definition of bullying is as follows:

"Bullying involves repeated acts of aggression over time: an isolated aggressive act, like a fight, is not bullying".

- Bullying in any form is not acceptable.
- Everyone must help to stop bullying.
- If you are bullied you should tell someone – a teacher, student or someone you feel safe with. It is right to be worried because it is an unpleasant thing to happen. Whatever you do, do not suffer in silence.
- If you see bullying going on, you should tell someone. If you do not, you are part of the problem, because you are helping the bully.
- If you are bullying someone you should stop. If you do not know how to stop, ask someone to help you, you will not get into trouble for that.

Bullying is not tolerated at Barnwell and is dealt with quickly and effectively on the very rare occasion it may occur.

EMOTIONAL WELLBEING AND BEHAVIOUR POLICY

Barnwell has an emotional and wellbeing behaviour policy which issues a clear set of guidelines in order to achieve a high standard of pro-social behaviour. There are also appropriate consequences if these standards are not met, the school does not tolerate poor choices of behaviour and conduct. We want the best for each student, and we work hard to promote personal responsibility for behaviour, high quality work and successful personal development through 'The Barnwell Way'. We do not tolerate negative behaviour, and students are supported using a series of strategies and, when necessary, sanctions that escalate in seriousness over a period of time. We work closely with parents to model and promote pro-social behaviour.

CHARGING AND REMISSIONS POLICY

In principle, all education is provided freely to all students. Any charges made by the school must meet the requirements of the most recent Education reform act. The school's activities, charging and remissions policy is available at the school. The school is conscious of the fact that it can be difficult for parents to make voluntary contributions for their children to take part in activities and, where this is the case, this should not disadvantage a student, and we make every effort to ensure that all students can participate.

CHILD PROTECTION POLICY

All schools have a clear responsibility placed upon them by the Education Act 2002 and by guidance from the department for education to safeguard the welfare of all of their students. In doing so, schools are expected to consult with Children's Services if they believe there is a possibility that a child may be suffering from abuse or neglect. A referral to Children's Services is not intended to be an accusation of any particular action or against any particular person. It is the report of any concern which have come to the school's attention. This is in accordance with Hertfordshire child protection procedures. Barnwell School has a child protection policy and a copy of Hertfordshire child protection procedures, both of which are available for parents/carers to see.

EQUITY AND DIVERSITY

Each student is considered to be an individual with unique needs and the matters of equity and diversity are central to the education provision at Barnwell. Support through our pastoral system, Character curriculum and ethics programme assists students in establishing themselves as valued individuals in our society. Support for learning opportunities is provided throughout the school and we constantly refine our curriculum in order to maximise the opportunities for each student. SPIRITUAL, MORAL, SOCIAL AND CULTURAL EDUCATION (SMSC)

The school provides a programme of PSHE lessons with a strong SMSC focus aimed at broadening student's understanding of the world we live in. Students gain a better understanding of the world we live in, along with knowledge of other cultures to develop an improved tolerance and appreciation for different values and morals. Topics covered across the curriculum include health education, community issues, sex education, online safety and cultural diversity.

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION AND COLLECTIVE WORSHIP
