CONTEXT

Founded in 1894, our College has a wonderful history but we are also forward thinking and outward looking. We are proud of the rich cultural and socio-economic diversity of our community. We have significant material poverty in the community with over 65% of our students coming from the most deprived areas but we do not have poverty of aspiration. Our students and families are highly aspirational and truly value education.

We are a Catholic Jesuit school and have a distinctive ethos but you do not have to be Catholic to attend this school. We welcome and are enriched by those of other faiths and no faith. We encourage all to play a full part in the spiritual life of the school and to gain a deeper understanding of their place in the world.

We have all boys ages from 11 - 16 and boys and girls in the Sixth Form. Boys only education during those critical years of development at KS3 and KS4 enables our boys to be themselves, develop at their rate, focus on their studies and interests, and pursue the areas that are often dominated by girls in mixed schools, areas such as music, dance, food and drama. For example, we have over 150 boys engaged in extracurricular music, often the same boys who excel on the rugby or football pitch or are in the Combined Cadet Force.

We celebrate and nurture a caring masculinity and aim to combat and

challenge stereotypes of both men and women. Welcoming girls into our growing and thriving Sixth Form has enriched our community and as such we believe that St Ignatius offers students the best of both worlds, all boys up to KS4 and a mixed Sixth Form to prepare our young men and women for adulthood.

Our key focus is academic achievement and our results are a testament to our commitment to ensuring the best possible outcomes for our students: at KS4 our boys achieve far higher than boys, nationally and locally, and this is similarly the case at KS5, for both our boys and girls. **In 2024, our Progress 8 score was 0.85, the highest of all secondary schools in Enfield and in the top 2.3% nationally.** We believe that with the right support, all can achieve regardless of their starting points or background.





ETHOS AND VALUES

Whilst we are proud of our high academic standards, we are about much more than academic results. We want our students to thrive in every way, academically, socially, culturally, emotionally, spiritually and physically. Intellectual formation is fundamental and a knowledge rich curriculum supports it but we also nurture social responsibility and ensure opportunity for all by broadening horizons. Our aim is for all in our community, staff and students, to be happy, safe, respected as individuals and to thrive in every way. It is our ambition that our students develop into men and women with the skills, qualifications and confidence to make a positive difference to the world and to live happy, successful, fulfilling lives.

Discipline and self-discipline are key to our success. We firmly believe that teachers have the right to teach and students have the right to learn. Our behaviour approach is 'Disruption Free Learning' to ensure that this is a reality. Relationships define our community. We

are an open, welcoming and warm community. The candidate appointed to this post will have a wonderful opportunity to grow in professional confidence and to experience great personal fulfilment.

STAFF

Staff are key to our success. We nurture our staff and provide copious opportunities for development. We work collaboratively to ensure the best possible working conditions for our staff and staff wellbeing is our priority. We have initiatives in place such as a paid wellbeing day, early closures to support planning, two week Autumn half term, paid leave for those who are examiners, and ensuring that most after school events are on Thursdays to support a work life balance.

SOCIOLOGY DEPARTMENT

Sociology is one of the most popular options amongst pupils at the college at both KS4 and KS5. The successful candidate will be joining a team of teachers that have taught the Sociology for a number of years and have a strong sense of commitment and passion for the subject. The social sciences department has worked hard to remodel the curriculum for KS4 and KS5 Sociology to support the continued success of our pupils and the successful applicant will contribute to the continued success of the department in improving curriculum access. The department has embedded Rosenshine's principles into the core of its practice and encourages insightful discussions on all topics that the social sciences explore in order to support the

development of curious and empathetic students.

The social sciences department consistently produces good results with 30% of KS4 students obtaining 7-9 and 48% gaining 5-9 with a 0.22 P8 score in 2025. At KS5 our sociology results are also positive with an L3VA score of 0.13 and 96% of pupils last year obtaining grades A*-C with 38% of our cohort obtaining A*-B. A successful candidate will support in the development of the Sociology curriculum across KS4 and KS5 to ensure our students have the best opportunities to succeed in their education, offering their expertise and passion for the subject.



MAGIS DEPARTMENT

Magis is a Latin word meaning 'more' or 'greater' - as in our college motto *Ad maiorem Dei gloriam*. Our Magis curriculum goes beyond the academic and provides a curriculum for living in the real world. It covers aspects of personal development, relationships and sex education, careers, financial literacy, public speaking and healthy living. This is central to our educational vision as, at St Ignatius College, *cura personalis* - or 'care for the whole person' - is at the heart of our philosophy. We want students to be educated in all areas of life: academically, emotionally, physically, artistically, culturally, socially and spiritually. We want them to grow to be confident, successful, responsible, fulfilled adults, working to make our world a better place.

To this end, all students at KS3 receive two Magis lessons every fortnight, in addition to twelve drop-down periods and three drop-down days per academic year. Students also receive all of this input at KS4 and 5, with the exception of the two timetabled lessons per fortnight.

The Magis curriculum is underpinned by the belief in the unique dignity of the human person, made in the image of God. Therefore, our approach is rooted in the Catholic teachings around the human person, presented in the positive framework of broader Christian ideals. It is

concerned with nurturing human wholeness and is integral to the physical, spiritual, emotional, moral, social and intellectual development of pupils. It is centred on Christ's vision of being human as good news and is positive and prudent, showing the potential for development, while enabling understanding and appreciation of the dangers and risks which may be faced in the real world.

The Magis curriculum has become a core part of our College experience, allowing students to become more effective men and women for others and allowing for *cura personalis*, educating our students for the real world. Students value Magis and look forward to their lessons, sessions and drop-down days throughout the year, feeling empowered by their lessons to ask questions and be inquisitive about themselves and the wider world.

As a Magis teacher, all resources are centrally planned and provided, meaning that Magis teachers can focus on adaptive teaching based on the needs of their classes, thus providing the best outcomes for students. This also ensures that all teachers are comfortable with the Catholic and Jesuit messaging which runs through our curriculum and can be confident that the lessons they are delivering fulfil the statutory requirements set out by the DfE in terms of Citizenship and RSHE.

CURRICULUM

We have developed an academically rigorous, knowledge rich curriculum that is challenging, engaging and stimulating, and supports students to gain the powerful knowledge in each discipline.

We invest time and resources into curriculum development, including providing subject areas with curriculum planning time and working with external curriculum experts to develop our curriculum and pedagogy. Our curriculum teams map the key powerful knowledge, concepts and skills that students need to gain in order to achieve mastery in their disciplines, and the successful candidate will have a deep understanding of knowledge rich curriculum.

We review our curriculum regularly to ensure that it equips our students for the twenty first century. For example, we teach Mandarin and are introducing Latin in September in order to provide our students with a challenging and rich curriculum.



We have designed a Magis curriculum at KS3 to teach explicitly a range of issues such as emotional literacy and intelligence, keeping good mental health, teamwork, positive relationships, dealing with conflict and compromise, self-belief, self-management, and interpersonal skills.

Our extracurricular programme is fundamental to achieving our goal of developing each individual. We aim to be leaders in innovative curriculum design and pedagogy over the coming years.



TEACHING AND LEARNING

We are striving to be a community with a genuine passion and excitement about how students learn and how teachers teach; where teachers are learners, collaborating with and developing one another. We believe that we can only develop practice by ensuring that teachers have the opportunity to reflect, challenge and support one another. Staff are our most valuable resource and we invest in staff development. Every fortnight, we have our teaching and learning briefing and all training takes place on weekly Professional Thursdays from 3.20 - 4.50 pm. We also close the school early on one day per half term to support our work on curriculum development.

Staff work collaboratively on areas of practice. We have developed our pedagogical approach based on Rosenshine's principles; we have developed a knowledge rich curriculum

and adopt ELKLAN strategies to cater for those with speech, language and communication needs. We are currently working on developing staff expertise in mediating text i.e. developing students' reading skills.

We work closely with other organisations and schools and our staff have access to a range of middle and senior leadership programmes including the National Professional Qualifications. However, we find that our best CPD is delivered in school. We are an evaluative and self-reflective professional community
