SAFER RECRUITMENT POLICY

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Recruitment, selection and disclosure policy and procedure

1. Introduction

The Regulation Station is committed to providing the best possible care and education to its students and to safeguarding and promoting the welfare of children and young people. The Provision is also committed to providing a supportive and flexible working environment to all its members of staff. The Provision recognises that, to achieve these aims, it is of fundamental importance to attract, recruit and retain staff of the highest calibre who share this commitment.

The aims of the Provision's recruitment policy are as follows:

- to ensure that the best possible staff are recruited based on their merits, abilities and suitability for the position
- to ensure that all job applicants are considered equally and consistently
- to ensure that no job applicant is treated unfairly on any grounds including race, colour, nationality, ethnic or national origin, religion or religious belief, sex or sexual orientation, marital or civil partner status, gender reassignment, disability or age
- to ensure compliance with all relevant legislation, recommendations and guidance including the statutory guidance published by the Department for Education (**DfE**), *Keeping children safe in education* (1 September 2022) (**KCSIE**), *Disqualification under the Childcare Act 2006* (**DUCA**), the Prevent Duty Guidance for England and Wales 2015 (the **Prevent Duty Guidance**) and any guidance or code of practice published by the Disclosure and Barring Service (**DBS**); and
- to ensure that the Provision meets its commitment to safeguarding and promoting the welfare of children and young people by carrying out all necessary pre-employment checks.

Employees involved in the recruitment and selection of staff are responsible for familiarising themselves with and complying with the provisions of this policy.

2. Data protection

The Provision is legally required to carry out the pre-appointment checks detailed in this procedure. Staff and prospective staff will be required to provide certain information to the Provision to enable the Provision to carry out the checks that are applicable to their role. The Provision will also be required to provide certain information to third parties, such as the Disclosure and Barring Service and the Teaching Regulation Agency. Failure to provide requested information may result in the Provision not being able to meet its employment, safeguarding or legal

obligations. The Provision will process personal information in accordance with its Data Protection Policy.

3. Recruitment and selection procedure

All applicants for employment will be required to complete an application form containing questions about their academic and employment history and their suitability for the role. Applicants will also be asked to provide details of their online profile, including account names and social media handles so that online searches can be carried out on shortlisted candidates (see section 4 for more information). This information must be provided by the applicant for the application to be accepted.

Incomplete application forms will be returned to the applicant where the application deadline has not passed. Should there be any gaps in academic or employment history, a satisfactory explanation must be provided. A curriculum vitae will not be accepted in place of the completed application form.

Applicants will receive a job description and person specification for the role applied for. Application forms, job descriptions, person specifications, this policy and the Provision's Child Protection Policy are available to download from the Provision's website and can be printed and forwarded to applicants on request.

The Provision will then conduct a shortlisting exercise by reviewing all application forms received to determine which applicants will be invited for interview. The shortlisting exercise will usually be conducted by two members of staff [who will ideally also be involved in the interview process].

Shortlisted applicants will be invited to attend a formal interview at which their skills and experience will be discussed in more detail. All shortlisted applicants will be tested at interview about their suitability to work with children.

All shortlisted applicants will be required to complete a self-declaration form prior to interview in which they will be asked to provide information about their criminal records history and other factors relevant to their suitability to work with children. This information will be considered and discussed with applicants at interview. If the Provision decides to make an offer of employment following the formal interview, any such offer will be conditional on the following:

- the agreement of a mutually acceptable start date and the signing of a contract incorporating the Provision's standard terms and conditions of employment
- verification of the applicant's identity (where that has not previously been verified)

- verification of qualifications, whether professional or otherwise, which the Provision considers in making the appointment decision, or which are referred to in the application form, whether a requirement for the role or not
- verification of the applicant's employment history
- the Provision being satisfied that any information generated through online searches does not make the applicant unsuitable to work at the Provision
- the receipt of two references (one of which must be from the applicant's most recent employer) which the Provision considers to be satisfactory
- for positions which involve "teaching work", information about whether the applicant has ever been referred to, or is the subject of a sanction, restriction or prohibition issued by the Teaching Regulation Agency which renders them unable or unsuitable to work at the Provision
- for applicants who have carried out teaching work outside the UK, information about whether the applicant has ever been referred to, or is the subject of a sanction issued by a regulator of the teaching profession in any other country which renders them unable or unsuitable to work at the Provision
- where the position amounts to "regulated activity" (see section 3(c) below) the receipt of an enhanced disclosure from the DBS which the Provision considers to be satisfactory
- where the position amounts to "regulated activity" (see section 3(c) below) confirmation that the applicant is not named on the Children's Barred List*
- information about whether the applicant has ever been subject to a direction under section 142 of the Education Act 2002 which renders them unable or unsuitable to work at the Provision
- for management positions, information about whether the applicant has ever been referred to the Department for Education, or is the subject of a direction under section 128 of the Education and Skills Act 2008 which renders them unable or unsuitable to work at the Provision
- confirmation that the applicant is not disqualified from acting as a trustee/governor or senior manager of a charity under the Charities Act 2011 (if applicable, see section 3(f) below)
- confirmation that the applicant is not disqualified from working in connection with early or later years provision (if applicable, see section 3(g) below)
- verification of the applicant's medical fitness for the role (see section 3(h) below)
- verification of the applicant's right to work in the UK; and
- any further checks which the Provision decides are necessary as a result of the applicant having lived or worked outside of the UK which may include an overseas criminal records check, certificate of good conduct or professional references.

The Provision's offer of employment informs the successful applicant that they cannot commence work until they have received their Provision identification and that they must report to the Head of Provision on their first day of work to receive their identification. Staff identification is issued to new starters by the Head of Provision only.

A recruitment checklist is completed by the Head of Provision for all appointments which lists the pre-appointment checks that have been completed for each successful applicant and the date on which each check is completed. When all checks are complete the checklist is signed by the Head of Provision and the Designated Safeguarding Lead. Newly appointed staff are not permitted to commence work at the Provision unless the recruitment checklist has been completed and signed by both the Head of Provision and the Designated Safeguarding Lead. The completed checklist is retained on the individual staff member's personnel file.

Once the recruitment checklist is signed by the Head of Provision and the Designated Safeguarding Lead, the Head of Provision sends an email to the new staff member's Line Manager to confirm that they can commence work. The date of this email is recorded on the single central register and a copy of the email is retained on the individual's personnel file. No one is permitted to commence work unless this email has been received. A failure by any member of staff to observe this protocol may be treated as a disciplinary matter.

**The Provision is not permitted to check the Children's Barred List unless an individual will be engaging in "regulated activity". The Provision is required to carry out an enhanced DBS check for all staff, supply staff and board members who will be engaging in regulated activity. However, the Provision can also carry out an enhanced DBS check on a person who would be carrying out regulated activity but for the fact that they do not carry out their duties frequently enough i.e. roles which would amount to regulated activity if carried out more frequently.*

Whether a position amounts to "regulated activity" must therefore be considered by the Provision to decide which checks are appropriate. It is however likely that in nearly all cases the Provision will be able to carry out an enhanced DBS check and a Children's Barred List check.

4. Pre-employment checks

In accordance with the recommendations set out in KCSIE and DUCA the Provision carries out a number of pre-employment checks in respect of all prospective staff.

In fulfilling its obligations to carry out pre-employment checks the Provision does not discriminate on the grounds of race, colour, nationality, ethnic or national origin, religion or religious belief, sex or sexual orientation, marital or civil partner status, gender reassignment, disability or age.

4.1 Online Searches

In addition to the checks set out below, the Provision reserves the right to obtain such formal or informal background information about an applicant as is reasonable in the circumstances to determine whether they are suitable to work at the Provision. In accordance with paragraph 220 of KCSIE this will include online searches on shortlisted candidates (**online searches**). The online searches the Provision carries out may include searches of internet search engines, websites and social media platforms. Applicants are asked in the application form to provide details of their online profile, including account names and social media handles. This information will be used to carry out online searches. Applicants are not required to provide account passwords or to grant the Provision access to private social media accounts.

Online searches may be carried out at the shortlisting stage or after an offer of employment has been made (but prior to work commencing). the Provision will not carry out online searches as part of its initial sift of applications.

The Provision will determine how it approaches online searches on a case-by-case basis. However, all applicants for a role at the Provision will be treated consistently regarding online searches.

Wherever possible online searches will be undertaken by a person who will play no other part in the recruitment process or the appointment decision. In carrying out online searches the Provision is looking for any publicly available information about an applicant that:

- may be relevant to their suitability to carry out the role for which they have applied;
- may be relevant to their suitability to work at the Provision or in an education setting;
- is of a safeguarding nature; and/or
- may have an impact on the Provision's reputation (whether positive or negative).

Any information generated from online searches will be entered in an 'Online search results record'. Where online searches are undertaken on shortlisted

applicants any relevant information generated will be provided to the interview panel for discussion with shortlisted applicants at interview. Where online searches are undertaken on the successful applicant only any relevant information generated will be discussed prior to employment commencing. All offers of employment will be conditional upon the Provision being satisfied that the successful applicant is suitable to work at the Provision considering any information generated from online searches.

In evaluating any online information for relevance, the Provision will use the following criteria:

- whether the information is relevant to the position applied for
- whether the information is relevant to the applicant's suitability to work at the Provision or in an education setting
- whether the information could have an impact on the Provision's reputation (whether positive or negative)
- whether the information calls into doubt the applicant's willingness or ability to uphold the Provision's commitment to safeguarding and promoting the welfare of children
- the length of time since the information became publicly available and whether the applicant's circumstances have changed since the information was published
- whether the information reveals a pattern of concerning behaviour; and
- the relevant circumstances and the explanation(s) offered by the applicant.

For successful candidates, the Provision will retain information generated through online searches for the duration of the individual's employment and in accordance with its Retention of Records Policy after employment ends.

For unsuccessful candidates, the Provision retains the information generated from online searches for six months from the date on which they are informed their application was unsuccessful, after which it will be securely destroyed.

4.2 Verification of identity

All applicants who are invited to an interview will be required to bring with them evidence of their identity, right to work in the UK, address and qualifications.

The Provision asks for this information at interview to ensure that the person attending interview is who they claim to be, that they are permitted to work for the Provision if appointed and that they hold appropriate qualifications.

- Identity and address: all applicants must bring with them to interview, original documents which evidence their identity and address as set out below and in the list of valid identity documents (these requirements comply

with DBS identity checking guidelines):

- one document from Group 1*; and
- two further documents from either of Group 1*, Group 2a or Group 2b, one of which must verify the applicant's current address; and

(*applicants must always provide their birth certificate as one form of identity unless there is good reason why this cannot be provided).

Where an applicant claims to have changed their name by deed poll or any other means (e.g. marriage, adoption, statutory declaration) they will be required to provide documentary evidence of the change. They will also be required to provide their birth certificate.

The Provision asks for the date of birth of all applicants to verify identity and check for any unexplained discrepancies in the employment and education history. The Provision does not discriminate on the grounds of age.

4.3 Right to work in the UK

All applicants must also bring to interview a valid form of evidence which confirms their right to work in the UK. Valid forms of evidence can be found in the Home Office 'Right to Work Checklist'.

The Provision will check this evidence in accordance with the Home Office 'Code of Practice on preventing illegal working: Civil penalty scheme for employers: 1 July 2021'

4.4 Qualifications

All applicants must also bring to interview original documents which evidence any educational and professional qualifications referred to in their application form and/or which the Provision requests.

4.5 References

References will be taken up on short listed applicants prior to interview where possible. Please note that no questions will be asked about health or medical fitness prior to any offer of employment being made.

All offers of employment will be subject to the receipt of a minimum of two references which are considered satisfactory by the Provision. One of the references must be from the applicant's current or most recent employer. If the current/most recent employment does/did not involve work with children, then the second reference should be from the employer with whom the applicant most recently worked with children. Neither referee should be a relative or someone known to the applicant solely as a friend.

All referees will be asked whether they believe the applicant is suitable for the job for which they have applied and whether they have any reason to believe that the

applicant is unsuitable to work with children. All referees will be sent a copy of the job description and person specification for the role for which the applicant has applied. If the referee is a current or previous employer, they will also be asked to confirm the following:

- the applicant's dates of employment, salary, job title/duties, reason for leaving, performance, sickness* and disciplinary record
- whether the applicant has ever been the subject of disciplinary procedures involving issues related to the safety and welfare of children (including any in which the disciplinary sanction has expired), except where the issues were deemed to have resulted from allegations which were found to be unsubstantiated, unfounded, false, or malicious
- whether any allegations or concerns have been raised about the applicant that relate to the safety and welfare of children or young people or behaviour towards children or young people, except where the allegation or concerns were found to be unsubstantiated, unfounded, false, or malicious
- whether the applicant could be considered to be involved in "extremism" (see the definition of "extremism" at section below).

(*questions about health or sickness records will only be included in reference requests sent out after the offer of employment has been made.)

The Provision will only accept references obtained directly from the referee and it will not rely on references or testimonials provided by the applicant or on open references or testimonials.

The Provision will compare all references with any information given on the application form. Any discrepancies or inconsistencies in the information will be taken up with the applicant and the relevant referee before any appointment is confirmed.

If it has not been possible to obtain a reference prior to interview it will be reviewed upon receipt. Any discrepancies identified between the reference and the application form and/or the interview assessment form will be considered by the Provision. The applicant may be asked to provide further information or clarification before an appointment can be confirmed.

If factual references are received i.e., those which contain limited information such as job title and dates of employment, this will not necessarily disadvantage an applicant although additional references may be sought before an appointment can be confirmed.

The Provision may at its discretion make telephone contact with any referee to verify the details of the written reference provided.

The Provision treats all references given or received as confidential which means that the applicant will not usually be provided with a copy.

All references received from a school must be countersigned by the Head of that school.

All internal candidates who apply for a new role at the Provision will have their application assessed in accordance with this procedure. References may be taken up on internal candidates as part of the application process and can be provided by colleagues as the Provision will be the most recent employer and will previously have taken up references from past employers.

4.6 Criminal records checks

Prior to 29 May 2013 an enhanced disclosure contained details of all convictions on record (including those which are defined as "spent" under the Rehabilitation of Offenders Act 1974) together with details of any cautions, reprimands or warnings held on the Police National Computer. It could also contain non-conviction information from local police records which a chief police officer considered relevant to the role applied for at the Provision.

4.7 DBS filtering rules

With effect from 29 May 2013 the DBS commenced the filtering and removal of certain specified information relating to old and minor criminal offences from all criminal records disclosures. The filtering rules developed by the DBS and the Home Office designate certain spent convictions and cautions as "protected". "Protected" convictions and cautions are not included in a DBS certificate and job applicants are not required to disclose them during the recruitment process. It is unlawful for an employer to take into account a conviction or caution that should not have been disclosed. If a protected conviction or caution is inadvertently disclosed to the Provision during the recruitment process it must be disregarded when making a recruitment decision.

A conviction will always be disclosable if it was imposed for a "specified offence" committed at any age. A caution issued for a "specified offence" committed over the age of 18 will always be disclosable. However, a caution issued for a "specified offence" committed under the age of 18 is never disclosable. "Specified offences" are usually of a serious violent or sexual nature or are relevant for safeguarding children and vulnerable adults. The list of "specified offences" can be found at: <https://www.gov.uk/government/publications/dbs-list-of-offences-that-will-never-be-filtered-from-a-criminal-record-check>

The filtering rules have recently been updated and work as follows:

For those aged 18 or over at the time of an offence

A spent criminal conviction for an offence committed in the United Kingdom when a person was over the age of 18 will not be disclosed in a DBS certificate (and does not have to be disclosed by the job applicant) if:

1. eleven years have elapsed since the date of the conviction;
2. it did not result in a custodial sentence; and
3. it was not imposed for a "specified offence".

A spent caution for an offence committed when a person was over the age of 18 will not be disclosed in a DBS certificate (and does not have to be disclosed by a job applicant) if:

1. six years have elapsed since the date it was issued; and
2. it was not issued for a "specified offence".

For those aged under 18 at the time of an offence

A spent conviction for an offence committed when a person was under the age of 18 will not be disclosed in a DBS certificate (and does not have to be disclosed by a job applicant) if:

1. five and a half years have elapsed since the date of the conviction;
2. it did not result in a custodial sentence; and
3. it was not imposed for a "specified offence".

A caution issued for an offence committed when a person was under the age of 18 will never be disclosed in a DBS certificate (and does not have to be disclosed by a job applicant).

Regulated activity

The Provision applies for an enhanced disclosure from the DBS and a check of the Children's Barred List (now known as an Enhanced Check for Regulated Activity) in respect of all positions at the Provision which amount to "regulated activity" as defined in the Safeguarding Vulnerable Groups Act 2006 (as amended). The purpose of carrying out an Enhanced Check for Regulated Activity is to identify whether an applicant is barred from working with children by inclusion on the Children's Barred List and to obtain other relevant suitability information. Any position undertaken at, or on behalf of the Provision will amount to "regulated activity" if it is carried out:

1. frequently, meaning once a week or more; or
2. overnight, meaning between 2.00 am and 6.00 am; or
3. satisfies the "period condition", meaning four times or more in a 30 day period; and
4. provides the opportunity for contact with children.

Roles which are carried out on an unpaid/voluntary basis will only amount to regulated activity if, in addition to the above, they are carried out on an unsupervised basis.

It is for the Provision to decide whether a role amounts to "regulated activity" considering all the relevant circumstances. However, nearly all posts at the Provision amount to regulated activity. Limited exceptions could include an administrative post undertaken on a temporary basis in the Provision office outside of term time or voluntary posts which are supervised.

The DBS disclosure certificate

The DBS issues the DBS disclosure certificate to the subject of the check only, rather than to the Provision. It is a condition of employment with the Provision that the original disclosure certificate is provided to the Provision within two weeks of it being received by the applicant. Original certificates should not be sent by post. A convenient time and date for bringing the certificate into the Provision should be arranged with the Head of Provision as soon as it has been received. Applicants who are unable to attend at the Provision to provide the certificate are required to send in a certified copy by post or email within two weeks of the original disclosure certificate being received. Certified copies must be sent to the Head of Provision. Where a certified copy is sent, the original disclosure certificate must still be provided on the first working day.

Employment will remain conditional upon the original certificate being provided and it being considered satisfactory by the Provision.

Starting work pending receipt of the DBS disclosure

If there is a delay in receiving a DBS disclosure the Head of Provision has discretion to allow an individual to begin work pending receipt of the disclosure certificate. This will only be allowed if all other checks, including a clear check of the Children's Barred List (where the position amounts to regulated activity), have been completed and once appropriate supervision has been put in place.

Applicants with periods of overseas residence

DBS checks will still be requested for applicants with recent periods of overseas residence and those with little or no previous UK residence. The Provision will take into account the "DBS unusual addresses guide" in such circumstances.

For applicants who are living overseas, or who have lived overseas previously, obtaining a DBS certificate may be insufficient to establish their suitability to work at the Provision. In such cases the applicant will be required to provide additional information about their suitability from the country (or countries) in which they have lived. The Provision's policy is to request such information from each

overseas country in which the applicant has lived for a period of three months or more in the previous five years including their country of origin.

When requesting such information, the Provision has regard to relevant government guidance and will therefore always require the applicant to apply for a formal check from the country in question i.e. a criminal records check (or equivalent) or a certificate of good conduct.

The Provision recognises that formal checks are not available from some countries, that they can be significantly delayed or that a response may not be provided. In such circumstances the Provision will seek to obtain further information from the country in question, such as a reference from any employment undertaken in that country.

In addition, where an applicant for a teaching position has worked as a teacher outside of the UK, the Provision will ask the applicant to obtain from the professional regulating authority of the teaching profession in each country in which they have worked as a teacher, evidence which confirms that they have not imposed any sanctions or restrictions on the applicant and that they are not aware of any reason why the applicant may be unsuitable to work as a teacher. The Provision will also ask shortlisted applicants (and their referees) to disclose whether they have ever been referred to, or are the subject of a sanction issued by, the regulator of the teaching profession in the countries in which they have carried out teaching work.

Sanctions and restrictions issued by the regulating authority of another country will not prevent a person from working as a teacher at the Provision. However, the Provision will take all relevant information into account in determining whether an applicant is suitable to work at the Provision.

The Provision may allow an applicant to commence work pending receipt of a formal check from a particular country if it has received a reference and/or letter of professional standing from that country and considers the applicant suitable to start work. Decisions on suitability will be based on all the information that has been obtained during the recruitment process. Unless expressly waived by the Provision, continued employment will remain conditional upon the Provision being provided with the outcome of the formal check and it being considered satisfactory.

If no information is available from a particular country the Provision may allow an applicant to commence work if they are considered suitable based on all the information that has been obtained during the recruitment process.

The Provision will take proportionate risk-based decisions on a person's suitability in these circumstances. All suitability assessments must be documented and retained on file

If the formal check is delayed and the Provision is not satisfied about the applicant's suitability in the absence of that information, the applicant's proposed start date may be delayed until the formal check is received.

Prohibition from teaching check

The Provision is required to check whether staff who carry out "teaching work" are prohibited from doing so. The Provision uses the Teaching Regulation Agency Teacher Services system to check whether successful applicants are the subject of a prohibition, or interim prohibition order issued by a professional conduct panel on behalf of the Teaching Regulation Agency.

In addition, the Provision asks all shortlisted applicants to declare whether they have ever been referred to, or are the subject of a sanction, restriction or prohibition issued by, the Teaching Regulation Agency or other equivalent body in the UK.

Where an applicant is not currently prohibited from teaching but has been the subject of a referral to, or hearing before, the Teaching Regulation Agency (or other equivalent body), whether or not that resulted in the imposition of a sanction, or where a sanction has lapsed or been lifted, the Provision will consider whether the facts of the case render the applicant unsuitable to work at the Provision.

The Provision applies the definition of "teaching work" set out in the Teachers' Disciplinary (England) Regulations 2012, which state that the following activities amount to "teaching work":

- planning and preparing lessons and courses for students
- delivering lessons to students
- assessing the development, progress, and attainment of students; and
- reporting on the development, progress, and attainment of students.

The above activities do not amount to "teaching work" if they are supervised by a qualified teacher or other person nominated by the Head of Provision. If in any doubt or if the applicant has taught previously, or may teach in future, the check will be undertaken, including for sports coaches.

Applicants are not required to disclose a caution or conviction for an offence committed in the United Kingdom if it has been filtered in accordance with the DBS filtering rules (see section above).

For the avoidance of doubt the Provision does not require applicants to request any criminal records information directly from the DBS. The Provision only requires applicants to provide relevant information about themselves "to the best of their knowledge".

Continuing duty to disclose change in circumstances

Staff in a relevant role are under an on-going duty to inform the Provision if their circumstances change in a way which would mean they subsequently meet any of the criteria for disqualification. Any failure to disclose relevant information now, or of a future change in circumstances, will be treated as a serious disciplinary matter and may lead to the withdrawal of a job offer or dismissal for gross misconduct.

Medical fitness

The Provision is legally required to verify the medical fitness of anyone to be appointed to a post at the Provision, after an offer of employment has been made but before the appointment can be confirmed.

It is the Provision's practice that all applicants to whom an offer of employment is made must complete a Health Questionnaire. The Provision will arrange for the information contained in the Health Questionnaire to be reviewed by the Provision's Leadership Team. This information will be reviewed against the Job Description and the Person Specification for the particular role, together with details of any other physical or mental requirements of the role i.e. proposed timetable, extra-curricular activities, layout of the Provision etc. If the Leadership Team has any doubts about an applicant's fitness the Provision will consider reasonable adjustments in consultation with the applicant. The Provision may also seek a further medical opinion from a specialist or request that the applicant undertakes a full medical assessment.

Successful applicants will be required to sign a declaration of medical fitness confirming that there are no reasons, on grounds of mental or physical health, why they should not be able to discharge the responsibilities required by the role. If an applicant prefers to discuss this with the Provision instead they should contact the Head of Provision so that appropriate arrangements can be made.

The Provision is aware of its duties under the Equality Act 2010. No job offer will be withdrawn without first consulting with the applicant, obtaining medical evidence, considering reasonable adjustments and suitable alternative employment.

4.8 Contractors and agency staff

The Provision must complete the same checks for contractors (and their employees) undertaking regulated activity at the Provision as it does for its own employees. The Provision requires written confirmation from the contractor that it has completed these checks on all those individuals whom it intends will work at the Provision before any such individual can commence work at the Provision.

Agencies who supply staff to the Provision must also complete the pre-employment checks which the Provision would otherwise complete for its staff. Again, the Provision requires confirmation that these checks have been completed before an individual can commence work at the Provision.

The Provision will independently verify the identity of individuals supplied by contractors or an agency and requires the provision of the DBS disclosure certificate before those individuals can commence work at the Provision.

4.9 Volunteers

The Provision will request an enhanced DBS disclosure and Children's Barred List information on all volunteers undertaking regulated activity with students at or on behalf of the Provision (the definition of regulated activity set out in section above will be applied to all volunteers).

The Provision will request an enhanced DBS disclosure without Children's Barred List information on all volunteers who do not undertake regulated activity. This is likely to be because their volunteering duties are subject to regular, day to day supervision by a fully checked member of staff or by a volunteer who the Provision has deemed appropriate to supervise and ensure the safety of those students in their care.

Under no circumstances will the Provision permit an unchecked volunteer to have unsupervised contact with students.

It is the Provision's policy that a new DBS certificate is required for volunteers who will engage in regulated activity but who have not been involved in any activities with the Provision for three consecutive months or more. Those volunteers who are likely to be involved in activities with the Provision on a regular basis may be required to sign up to the DBS update service as this permits the Provision to obtain up to date criminal records information without delay prior to each new activity in which a volunteer participates.

In addition, the Provision will seek to obtain such further suitability information about a volunteer as it considers appropriate in the circumstances. This may include (but is not limited to the following):

- formal or informal information provided by staff, parents, and other volunteers
- character references from the volunteer's place of work or any other relevant source; and
- an informal safer recruitment interview.

4.10 Visiting speakers and the Prevent Duty

The Prevent Duty Guidance requires the Provision to have clear protocols for ensuring that any visiting speakers, whether invited by staff or by students, are suitable and appropriately supervised.

The Provision is not permitted to obtain a DBS disclosure or Children's Barred List information on any visiting speaker who does not engage in regulated activity at the Provision or perform any other regular duties for or on behalf of the Provision.

All visiting speakers will be subject to the Provision's usual visitors' protocol. This will include signing in and out, the wearing of a visitors badge at all times and being escorted by a fully vetted member of staff between appointments. The Provision will also obtain such formal or informal background information about a visiting speaker as is reasonable in the circumstances to decide whether to invite and/or permit a speaker to attend the Provision. In doing so the Provision will always have regard to the visitors and security policy] the Prevent Duty Guidance and the definition of "extremism" set out in KCSIE which states:

""Extremism" is vocal or active opposition to fundamental British values, including democracy, the rule of law, individual liberty and mutual respect and tolerance of different faiths and beliefs. We also include in our definition of extremism calls for the death of members of our armed forces, whether in this country or overseas. Terrorist groups very often draw on extremist ideas developed by extremist organisations."

In fulfilling its Prevent Duty obligations the Provision does not discriminate on the grounds of race, colour, nationality, ethnic or national origin, religion or religious belief, sex or sexual orientation, marital or civil partner status, gender reassignment, disability or age.

4.11 Recruitment of ex-offenders

Background

The Provision will not unfairly discriminate against any applicant for employment because of conviction or other details disclosed. The Provision makes appointment decisions based on merit and ability. If an applicant has a criminal record this will not automatically bar them from employment with the Provision. Each case will be decided on its merits in accordance with the objective assessment criteria set out below.

All positions within the Provision are exempt from the provisions of the Rehabilitation of Offenders Act 1974. All applicants must therefore declare all previous convictions and cautions, including those which would normally be considered "spent" except those received for an offence committed in the United Kingdom if it has been filtered in accordance with the DBS filtering rules.

A failure to disclose a previous conviction (which should be declared) may lead to an application being rejected or, if the failure to disclose is discovered after employment has started, may lead to summary dismissal on the grounds of gross misconduct. A failure to disclose a previous conviction may also amount to a criminal offence.

It is unlawful for the Provision to employ anyone who is barred from working with children. It is a criminal offence for any person who is barred from working with children to apply for a position at the Provision. The Provision will make a report to

the Police and/or the DBS if:

- it receives an application from a barred person
- it is provided with false information in, or in support of an applicant's application; or
- it has serious concerns about an applicant's suitability to work with children.

Assessment criteria

In the event that relevant information (whether in relation to previous convictions or otherwise) is volunteered by an applicant during the recruitment process or obtained through a disclosure check, the Provision will consider the following factors before reaching a recruitment decision:

- whether the conviction or other matter revealed is relevant to the position in question
- the seriousness of any offence or other matter revealed
- the length of time since the offence or other matter occurred
- whether the applicant has a pattern of offending behaviour or other relevant matters
- whether the applicant's circumstances have changed since the offending behaviour or other relevant matters; and
- the circumstances surrounding the offence and the explanation(s) offered by the applicant.

If the post involves regular contact with children, it is the Provision's normal policy to consider it a high risk to employ anyone who has been convicted at any time of any the following offences:

- murder, manslaughter, rape, other serious sexual offences, grievous bodily harm or other serious acts of violence; or
- serious class A drug related offences, robbery, burglary, theft, deception or fraud.

If the post involves access to money or budgetary responsibility, it is the Provision's normal policy to consider it a high risk to employ anyone who has been convicted at any time of robbery, burglary, theft, deception or fraud.

If the post involves some driving responsibilities, it is the Provision's normal policy to consider it a high risk to employ anyone who has been convicted of drink driving within the last ten years.

Assessment procedure

In the event that relevant information (whether in relation to previous convictions or otherwise) is volunteered by an applicant during the recruitment process or obtained through a disclosure check, the Provision will carry out a

risk assessment by reference to the criteria set out above. The assessment form must be signed by the Head of the Provision before a position is offered or confirmed.

If an applicant wishes to dispute any information contained in a disclosure, they may do so by contacting the DBS. In cases where the applicant would otherwise be offered a position were it not for the disputed information, the Provision may, where practicable and at its discretion, defer a final decision about the appointment until the applicant has had a reasonable opportunity to challenge the disclosure information.

Retention and security of disclosure information

The Provision's policy is to observe the guidance issued or supported by the DBS on the use of disclosure information.

5. Whistleblowing and exit interviews

All staff are expected and encouraged to raise concerns they have, whether related to the safeguarding and welfare of students, the conduct of staff or other matters, during the course of their employment in accordance with the Provision's policies (including the Whistleblowing Policy, the Safeguarding Policy and the Staff Code of Conduct). All staff receive training so that they understand the Provision's expectations. Safeguarding children is at the centre of the Provision's culture and is accordingly considered formally during staff performance development reviews and appraisal and finally at an exit interview which is held with all leavers.

6. Referrals to the DBS and Teaching Regulation Agency

This policy is primarily concerned with the promotion and practice of safer recruitment. However, applicants should also be aware that the Provision has legal responsibilities to fulfil when employment comes to an end. In particular, the Provision has a legal duty to make a referral to the DBS where:

- an individual has applied for a position at the Provision despite being barred from working with children; and/or
- an individual has been removed by the Provision from working in regulated activity (whether paid or unpaid), or has resigned prior to being removed, because they have harmed, or pose a risk of harm to, a child.

The DBS will consider whether to impose sanctions on that individual which may restrict or prevent them from working with children in future.

In addition, if a teacher is dismissed because they are found to have committed serious misconduct, or they have breached the Teachers' Standards, or they resign prior to dismissal on such grounds, the Provision will make a referral to the Teaching Regulation Agency.

The Teaching Regulation Agency will consider whether to impose a prohibition from teaching order.

7. Queries

If an applicant has any queries on how to apply for a post at the Provision they should contact the Head of Provision.

Group 2a: trusted government documents

- current driving licence (photocard - full or provisional (all countries outside the UK excluding Isle of Man and Channel Islands)
- current driving licence (paper version if issued before 1998 - full or provisional; UK / Isle of Man / and Channel Islands)
- birth certificate - issued after time of birth (UK, Isle of Man and Channel Islands)
- marriage / civil partnership certificate (UK and Channel Islands)
- immigration document, visa or work permit (issued by a country outside the UK. Valid only for roles whereby the applicant is living and working outside of the UK. Visa / permit must relate to the non UK country in which the role is based)
- HM Forces ID card (UK)
- fire arms licence (UK, Channel Islands and Isle of Man)

All driving licenses must be valid.

Group 2b: Financial and social history documents

- mortgage statement (UK)**
- bank/building society statement (UK and Channel Islands)*
- bank/building society statement (countries outside the UK)*
- bank/building society account opening confirmation letter (UK)*

- credit card statement (UK)*
- financial statement - e.g., pension or endowment (UK)**
- P45/P60 statement (UK and Channel Islands)**
- council tax statement (UK and Channel Islands)**
- letter of sponsorship from future employment provider (non UK only; valid only for applicants residing outside the UK at the time of application; must be valid at time of application)
- utility bill (UK; not mobile telephone bill)*
- benefit statement - e.g. child benefit, pension (UK)*
- a document from central or local government/ government agency / local council giving an entitlement - e.g. from the Department for Work and Pensions, the Employment Service, HM Revenue & Customs (UK and Channel Islands) *
- EEA national ID card (must be valid at time of application)
