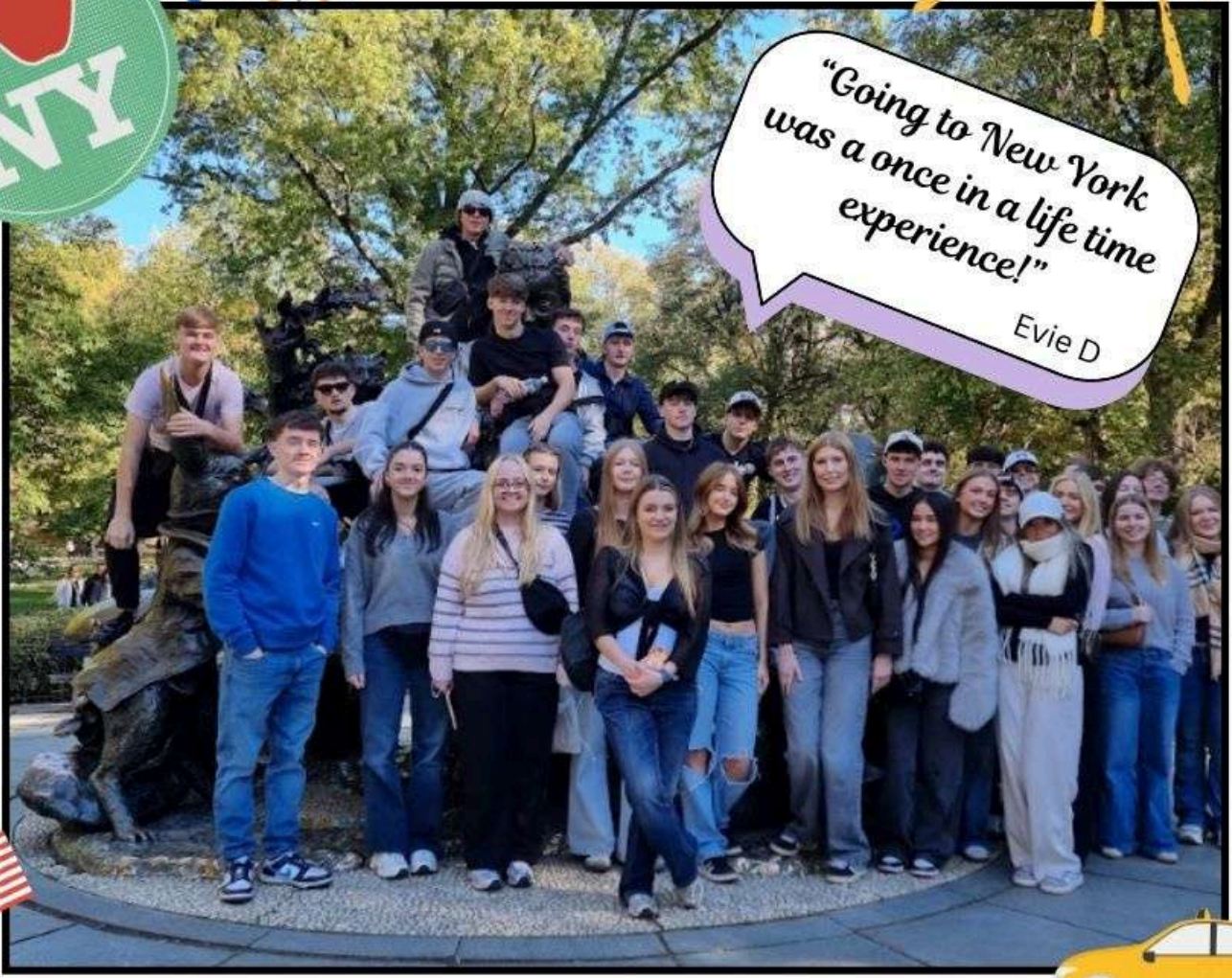


NEW YORK CITY

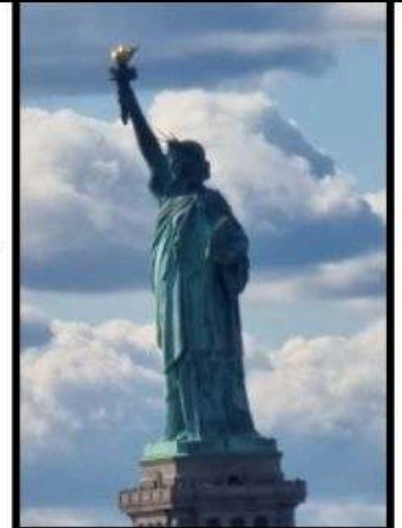

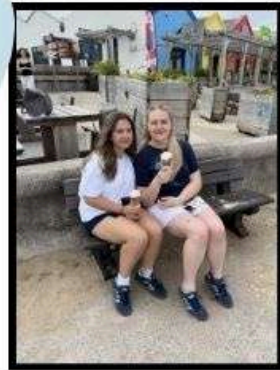

YEAR 13 GEOGRAPHY TRIP AT BIFOR

Year 13 Geographers spent the day at Birmingham Institute of Forest Research, having a guided tour of the Free-Air Carbon Enrichment FACE site in the morning followed by an informative session on Climate change creating digital trees to add to BiFor's presentation at COP30 in Brazil in November.

Built in 2016, BiFor's unique Free-Air Carbon Enrichment (FACE) facility exposes patches of 180-year-old oak woodland to elevated CO₂ concentrations (approximately 550ppm). BiFor-FACE provides data to challenge and constrain climate projection models and is the world's only place to study, by direct experiment, how the vast northern temperate forests will respond to future increases in atmospheric CO₂.

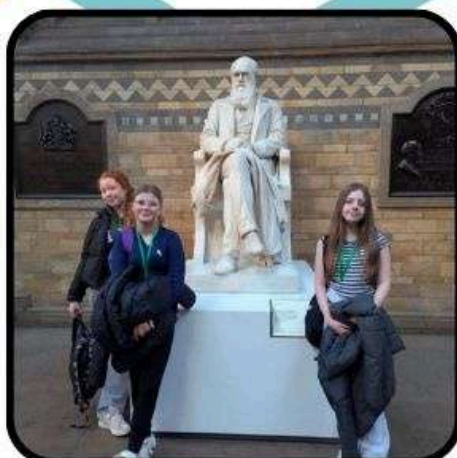


STEM TRIPS

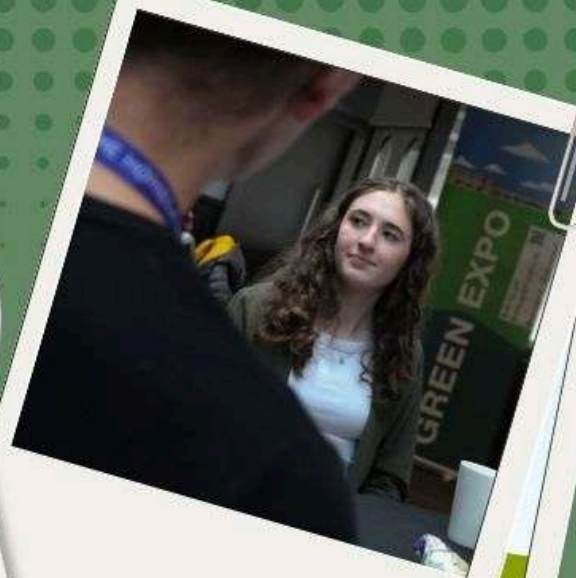
Maria, Fin and Lexi discussed the prevalence of E-bikes and the issues of legality that surround them.

NEXT STEPS

A few weeks later on the 3rd November, we attended an online follow up seminar organised by the trust. This included reflecting on the visit, discussing different thoughts and feelings about the trip. We also discussed post-trip projects that learners were planning on completing in order to become an ambassador, which involves: educating others, speaking at events, writing about the experience and much more.

MANCHESTER VISIT

On the 19th of October, four Year 12 learners attended an Orientation Seminar at the Pendulum Hotel in Manchester organised by The Holocaust Educational Trust. The day consisted of a series of talks and discussions covering topics such as, pre-war Jewish life, what life was like during the Holocaust and how to prepare for a Holocaust related site visit. We also heard an in person testimony from Janine Webber. She spoke about her childhood in Lvov Poland, the tragic deaths of her close family members and her life after the Holocaust. Her testimony was captivating and emotional, giving the learners more personal insight into the Jewish experience during WWII.

VISITING AUSCHWITZ

After an early start, we landed in Poland at 12:00 CEST and took an hour-long coach journey to Auschwitz 1. The visit consisted of a tour around the site, involving further talks and history of events that took place there. We also heard from two Rabbis, Rabbi Epstein and Rabbi Lebrecht, who gave additional insight throughout the day. The tour included museum exhibits, including the Book of Names and artefacts from the Holocaust. After we reached the end of the tour we took a coach journey to Auschwitz 2, the largest of the sites. As well as the tour, members of our group read out poetry written by people affected by the Holocaust and Rabbi Lebrecht read out a prayer in Hebrew and played the Jewish horn (the shofar). We took our time to pay our respects looking at both the site and the memorial dedicated to the victims and those affected by the Holocaust. After a long day we headed back to the airport and arrived in Manchester at approximately 10:00.

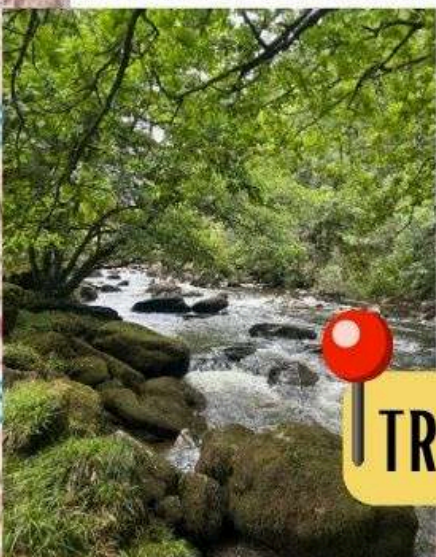
Putting tents up proved to be a difficult task, with the wind and rain almost blowing the tents away. We did have a beautiful rainbow across the campsite at tea-time.





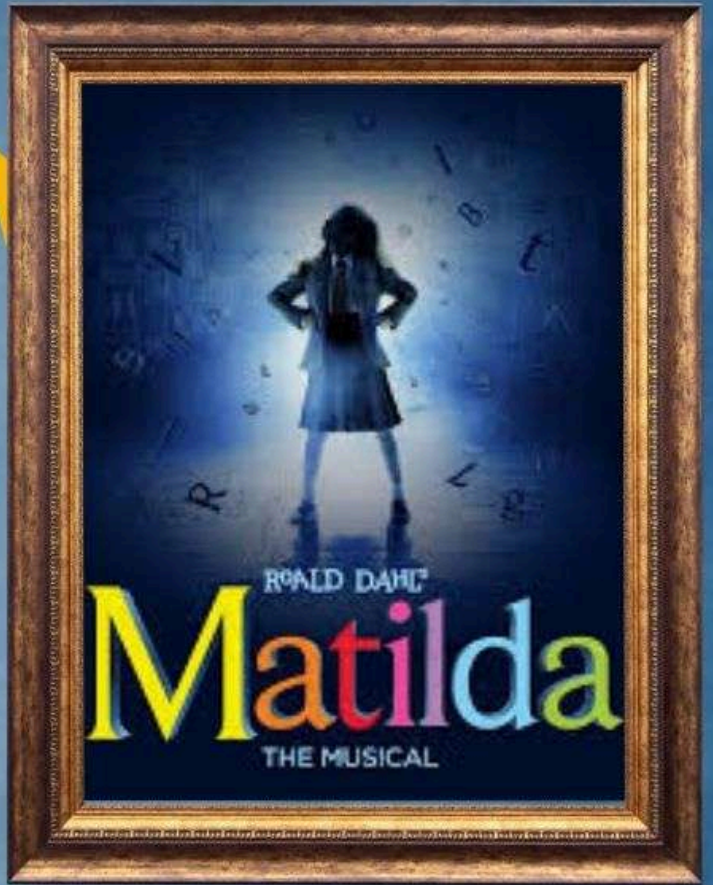

The learners were divided into two teams and given a design brief: to create an environmentally friendly product. They then worked collaboratively to develop their idea and later presented their pitch to a professional panel of judges.

Team 1 designed set of four healthy, fruit-based juices under the brand name 'Daily Dose'. The bottles were intended to be recycled using advanced technology bins located across the country. Customers would earn reward points and prizes for recycling the bottles, encouraging positive sustainable behaviour. The team delivered an excellent presentation, and the panel were extremely impressed with their concept.



One learner later reflected on the experience, stating:

"It was an eye-opening insight into the real business world and overall, I had a great time."

Although neither of the Upton teams won the overall competition, they both did an amazing job. The judges also selected two individual competitors across the entire event who stood out for their performance. We are very proud that Upton learner Sophia Mangan was chosen as one of these two winners for her leadership skills, public speaking, and creativity.
